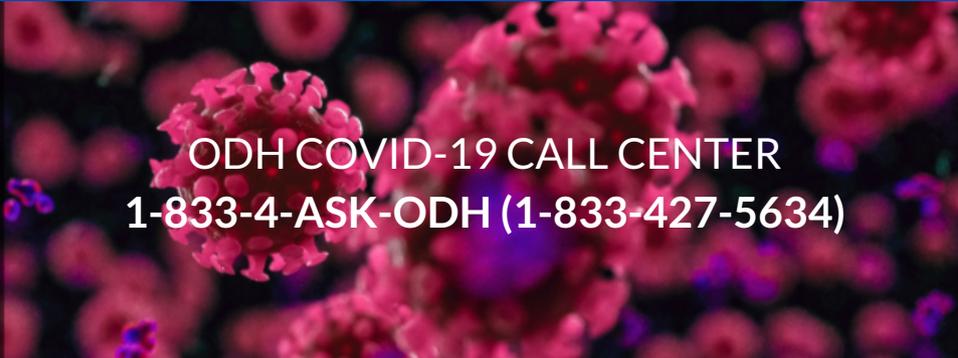

Please note: HCGHD will not be sharing information about individuals under public health supervision or under voluntary quarantine for COVID-19 in our county. These individuals are not showing any symptoms and are not under investigation. As is our normal practice when we monitor situations of infectious disease in the community, information will be shared as is necessary to protect the public while respecting individual's privacy. As with other diseases, we do not routinely share suspected case information until it is confirmed. The same will be done with COVID-19.

OVERVIEW:

Coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) is a respiratory illness that can spread from person to person. The virus that causes COVID-19 is a novel coronavirus that was first identified during an investigation into an outbreak in Wuhan, China. The World Health Organization declared COVID-19 a global pandemic on March 11, 2020.

COMMERCIAL EVICTIONS & FORECLOSURES

In an effort to blunt the negative economic impacts of COVID-19 on Ohio businesses, Governor Mike DeWine has issued an executive order addressing commercial property rents, evictions and foreclosures. The order is also meant to ensure that Ohio businesses are not placed at a competitive and economic disadvantage due to similar actions taken in other states.

The order:

- Requests that landlords suspend, for at least 90 days, rent payments for small business commercial tenants facing financial hardship due to the COVID-19 pandemic. It does not negate the obligations of small business commercial tenants to pay rent at a future time.
- Requests that landlords place a moratorium on evictions of small business commercial tenants for at least 90 days.
- Requests that lenders provide commercial real estate borrowers with mortgage loans an opportunity for a forbearance of at least 90 days as a result of a financial hardship due to the COVID-19 pandemic. This means lenders should refrain from enforcing default penalties. It does not negate the obligations of commercial real estate borrowers but provides time for solutions to be worked out.


Other related information:

- Time limitations for criminal, civil, and administrative court proceedings that were set to expire between March 9, 2020, and July 30, 2020, have been placed on hold via the enactment of an Ohio COVID-19 relief bill.
- The Supreme Court of Ohio has asked local courts to postpone eviction filings, eviction proceedings, scheduled move-outs, and the execution of foreclosure judgments as appropriate.
- The federal COVID-19 relief act and other federal directives place a temporary period of postponement on many evictions and foreclosures related to residential properties.
